A Note on Lent

As Christ-followers, Lent is to prepare our hearts to focus on the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, through participating in repentance and reflection.

These weekly reflections, with carefully selected passages from the gospel of Mark, are meant to help you to pause, pray and meditate. They are flexible enough to be used as your weekly devotional or as an additional reflection material for the six weeks of Lent.

We hope that you will find this an enriching resource for your life with God.

Meditative Reading

For these six weeks of Lent reflections, we are leaning into passages from Mark using this 5-R Meditative Reading tool:

1 RELAX

Prepare your heart and unbusy your mind. Turn off distractions. Get away, slow down, and breathe.

- READ

 Read a scripture passage. Read aloud if it helps.

 Notice what captures your attention.
- REFLECT

 Read the passage slowly a second time. What comes to mind?

 What is God highlighting?
- RESPOND

 Read a third time. Is there a reminder, challenge or prompting to respond to or obey?
- REST

 After reading, rest and wait in God's presence.

 Allow some time to just "be".
